Pledge Summary

The City of Des Moines Iowa is in the heart of the Midwest and in the heart of the fall Monarch Migration flight way. The City of Des Moines Parks and Recreation along with the Blank Park Zoo, Science Center of Iowa, and Des Moines Botanical Center all work together to promote and provide support for Monarch Conservation in our city. Mayor Cownie has committed to conservation and sustainable practices that enhance our city as well as provide habitat for monarch butterflies, pollinators, and wildlife in our city.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. - Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

The Mayor declared No Mow May for 2023. Parks and Recreation maintains no mow areas, hosts annual milkweed planting events, designs public storm water basins with native vegetation. Blank Park Zoo and the Des Moines Botanical Gardens have native plantings on their property. Parks uses burning for maintenance in native areas for management of invasive species of plants.

Annually, Neighborhood Associations order plants from the city greenhouse at no cost to their associations. The plant orders must contain at least 10% natives. The order forms have species information that shows pollinator friendly and host plants for monarchs and other pollinators. The plants are required to be planted in neighborhood rights-of-ways, libraries, public properties and schools.

Asclepias incarnata, Ascepias tuberosa, Liatris ligulistylis and Echinacea pallida were supplimented into a garden plot that holds a large amount of Asclepias syriaca. The garden is maintained by the gardeners that have plots at this location.

Upcycle is a volunteer based program where the volunteers work to remove invasive species in our public parks. The removed material is then upcycled to the Blank Park Zoo when appropriate for animal enrichment. There is also a partnership with a local brewery that provides the volunteers with a cold beverage after the work is done. Plants are cut or pulled and stumps chemically treated to stop regrowth.
