Pledge Summary

Established in 1855, the Town of Whitby is situated on the north shore of Lake Ontario, 30 km east of Toronto. The Town maintains 125 parks with 950 acres of active parkland, over 1000 acres of passive open space, and approximately 75 kilometres of trails. The estimated population is 138,300 and Durham Region predicts the population of Whitby will be approximately 200,000 by 2033. The Town of Whitby's mission to create and maintain a sustainable, healthy, and safe community/environment can be achieved, in part, through the maintenance, restoration, and enhancement of the Town's green infrastructure. A healthy habitat for pollinators is an integral component of the municipality.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)

Systems Change

- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.

The Town of Whitby is currently reviewing a community garden application (King Street Cooperative Community Garden) which includes a food forest permaculture garden that will enhance the local organic food supply chain. Volunteer planting events to create monarch habitat will continue to be a priority to engage the community and allow people of various backgrounds to participate in planting events. Allowing for habitat areas in public parks throughout Whitby allows people to enjoy the spaces at their leisure.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Staff led initiative to grow native locally sourced planting material (small in-house native plant nursery) from locally sourced seeds. The plant material will be used for planting events on Town owned land (e.g. celebrate earth day, pollinator week, youth planting events, staff planting events) . One project highlight was the town's waterfront trail project which allowed for 5.3 acres of native seed to be installed to enhance monarch habitat along the shoreline of Lake Ontario. A new trail project located in the open space southwest of Thicksen Road and Dryden Boulevard allowed for the enhancement of 5.5 acres of monarch habitat through the addition of native trees, shrubs and seed.

Invasive species removal in isolated areas of Bradley Park, Pringle Park, Ash Creek Trail, Willow Park, Prince Of Wales Park, Jack Wilson Park, Portage Park, Bassett Park, D'Hillier Park, and Darren Park. Invasive species were removed manually according to best practices set by the Ontario Invasive Plant Council. No herbicides were applied to manage invasive species in these areas. If this action is In Progress, please describe your progress and a target date when you plan to complete action.

This is an ongoing action: In Spring 2021, The Whitby Sustainability Advisory Committee hosted Climate Conversations -A four-part webinar series to help increase knowledge and awareness of the natural environment and how it is impacted by climate change. Topics covered in the spring of 2021 included local food, the importance of wetlands, invasive species and Bees Love Trees. Climate Conversations are presented in partnership with Durham Farm Fresh, Central Lake Ontario Conservation(CLOCA), Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH) and Local Enhancement and Appreciation of Forests (LEAF). In 2021 Whitby Council approved continuing supporting the LEAF Backyard Tree Planting program for the next five years. This program enables residents to access a subsidized Backyard Tree Planting as well as access to other programs that LEAF offers including native plant kits and several educational tools.
