Pledge Summary

Southampton is a small, rural town of approximately 6,000 people in Western Massachusetts that is actively committed to preserving its open space and conservation areas. Residents value the town's agricultural heritage, its scenic areas and hiking trails. Community groups are supporting the Selectboard's signing of the Pledge and will expand their efforts to create conditions favorable to the monarch butterfly and other pollinators.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Systems Change

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.
- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Other small sites, such as the hill behind the Church used this year, and other small empty lots owned by the town are being considered for the spring. Education encouraging homeowners to plant pollinators has begun.

Initial conversations with the Highway Department and the Parks Commission. No commitment or plan enacted this year--will keep pursuing.

Initial demonstration pollinator pallet garden installed on empty hillside behind the church in the center of town. This supported annuals - flowers, herbs and vegetables - and harvest supplied to the community pantry. Extensive planning has occurred via the Open Space Committee in discussion with the Water Commission to dedicate a portion of watershed protected lot for a more 'formal' pollinator garden with signage next spring. This is located near the primary school and alongside an active walking route.

Member of the Conservation Commission publicize the need to control/remove invasive species on various conservation lands/hiking trails in town. They themselves actively do this as well as organize work-days for volunteers to help in this effort. They also engaged in a significant educational effort--developing Wanted Posters (see photos below) to post at certain trails and participated at the annual Celebrate Southampton event in August--explaining the issues with invasive species like multi-flora rose and bittersweet among others. Invasives are cut to the ground using weed whackers or clippers (carbohydrate deprivation).
