The Town is actively working toward initiatives that support tree canopy, pollinator habitat development, and native plant efforts.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters , other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

Public Works has added this topic to an executive team meeting by the end of this calendar year, 2024. The team recently researched the viability of adding pollinator plants to medians (abstract attached). It was advised to not plant pollinator plants in medians due to high mortality rates. The abstract, however, did provide valuable information on roadside plantings that connect with habitat on adjacent lands are beneficial to pollinators. Mowing practice guidelines were also shared and we intend to integrate the recommendations with contractors.
