The Town applied for grant funding through our local utility to add biodiversity to 3 parks in Town. One of those is in a historically black community. The gardens will be planted by summer of 2026.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

We are interested in promoting pro-pollinator habitats throughout our community. A large part of that is education. We held a native plant fair this year with several education elements surrounding pollinators and Monarchs. We are leading by example with the idea that our residents will also add pollinator-friendly plants to their yards.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

The examples you provide on mowing best practices and re-wording of ordinances was something we integrated into our policies.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We do several seed giveaways throughout the year and have partnered w/the local library to start a seed library. For the biodiversity project listed above, we plan to include signage to further promote / educate on pollinators and Monarchs specifically.

We actively work with our Public Works and Stormwater teams to advocate for more pollinator gardens and native plant inclusions. We confirmed that the contractor mowing many of our ROWs and other property, do indeed have a flushing bar and follow mowing best practices.

The Public Works dept. has completed the installation of a 100% Native Landscape Education Garden at Morrisville Community Park. With the assistance of local native plant nursery, Deep Roots Natives, the team was able to source over 70 varieties of native perennial flowers, shrubs, and trees. The team was supported by the Morrisville Environment & Stormwater Committee (MESC), the Morrisville Stewardship Program, and Morrisville's Sustainability Program during the planning and installation of this project.
