Pledge Summary

Brady is a small city in Central Texas with a population of over 5,000, ideally located in the center of Texas portion of the Monarch Flyway where in the last days of September, monarchs from Canada and the Northeast are funneled south into Mexico. Brady is also home to a butterfly and hummingbird garden that contains native plants, shrubs, and milkweeds and is adjacent to a 3/4 mile walking trail along the beautiful Brady Creek. brady Mayor, Anthony Groves, has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with his signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Maintained Hummingbird and Butterfly Garden, designated as Monarch Waystation #11349 on 7/21/2015. The garden has 6 varieties of milkweed: Antelope Horns Milkweed, Butterflyweed, Zizotes Milkweed, Texas Milkweed, Showy Milkweed, and Green Milkweed. Replacement milkweed and nectar plants were added as needed. Added new flowerbeds and plants to attract butterflies and other pollinators at Brady West Rehabilitation and Nursing Center. Added new nectar plants at the EarthKind Demonstration Garden.

The Central Texas Master Gardeners Association made significant contributions coordinating public awareness efforts, plus held many of their own educational programs and events. Heart of Texas Garden Club sponsored a Monarch butterfly lecture from an out of town speaker. The 3 middle schools participated in the art contest and show and was coordinated with a study of the life cycle of the Monarch butterflies. Brady West Rehabilitation bought potting soil and mulch for use in their pots and flower beds. KNEL and Brady Standard Herald broadcast and published articles on our informative and educational programs and events.

Please describe the community art project that was implemented in your community and how it contributed to cultural awareness and recognition (e.g., number of art installations, type of art).

To raise awareness of the Monarch butterflies in our community, a local metal artist created a Monarch butterfly sculpture for the public butterfly garden and we hosted two art related activities. One was an art contest/show open to students in the 6th, 7th and 8th grades. We coordinated with the art teacher at Brady middle school and the science teachers at the two small county schools. Teachers at these schools coordinated this with lessons on the life cycle of the butterflies. To facilitate this, we donated a poster of the life cycle of the Monarch butterfly to each school. We had over 100 entries to our show, which is quite a large number for a county as small as ours. Ribbons and certificates were awarded to students for outstanding work; the best of each school was given a cash prize. Artwork was displayed at the Texas A&M AgriLife Office. For interested people of all ages we sponsored a 'Paint a Monarch' session. We brought in an art instructor from a larger town to lead participants in painting Monarch butterflies. During the session CTMGA members told the group different facts about the butterflies. It was an enjoyable and educational experience.
