## Pledge Summary

Melita is a town located in the southwestern corner of the Canadian province of Manitoba. It is surrounded by the Municipality of Two Borders and occupies a bend of the Souris River. Located along PTH 3 and 83. With a population of ~1,000 residents we are a community working together to help create new habitat for Monarchs and to help them in any way we can. Being a part of the Mayoral Monarch Pledge program is very important to us and we look forward to continue to be a part of it for the years to come!

## Action Items Committed for 2021

### Communications and Convening

- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. We have a large amount of local farmland and farmers who understand the habitat of Monarchs and the importance of Milkweed and continue to support our goals to increase the Monarch Population by allowing Milkweed to grow where it is not a detriment to local economical growth.

We have planters on mainstreet that were planted with an Asclepias Tuberosa, and surrounding areas (mostly roadways) filled with Asclepias Syriaca and Incranta.

**How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?**

We are a very rural area community of less than 2,000 population, our annual income is moderate to low income on average. Our community engages everyone within the community and area regardless of social status to promote the increase in habitat and awareness of the Monarch Butterfly species.

Youth are a very engaged focus of our efforts, we provide free zoom presentations to schools and also promote classes to participate in our free milkweed seed giveaways. Also we have initiatives to engage elderly communities to help increase awareness for Monarch Butterflies, i.e our Monarch Lodge program found at MonarchHomestead.ca

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

We have hosted over 5 zoom presentations to not only classrooms within our region but across the Canadian Prairies (Sask, and Alberta provinces) we have continued our Monarch Lodge program within the City of Brandon and have engaged our local Retirement Community (Melita Lodge) to become our next official Monarch Lodge partner. We have also worked with local farmers to identify high risk areas for Monarchs where Milkweed is sprayed or cut and have rescued Many Monarch eggs and larva from these areas and provided them new homes with food in the Canadian Prairies to be raised and release in an active engagement Project.

Worked with local citizens to provide a Milkweed species that is not currently listed on provincial legislation as a Noxious Weed. Provide moderate costing Milkweed alternatives to plant as well as free Milkweed seed giveaways from seed obtained from local growers and native grasslands where Milkweed was found (Asclepias Incarnate, Asclepias Ovaliflia, and Asclepias Tuberosa)

We have engaged our local retirement Community at Melita Lodge (Antler River Retirement Community) to become an official Monarch Lodge partner for the 2022 year. We will have local volunteers provide Milkweed plants to their local garden spots, as well as introducing and training residents into the caretaking of Monarchs and Milkweed plants.

**Please describe the community art project that was implemented in your community and how it contributed to cultural awareness and recognition (e.g., number of art installations, type of art).**

We were able to plant a new species of Milkweed Tuberosa (hello yellow) in our town plants on mainstreet. While this variant proved to be robust, it did not yield as great a habitat for Monarchs as we had hoped, resulting in maybe 1-2 caterpillars observed feeding on the leaves.

We partnered with Melita's Green Team to plant the Hello Yellow milkweed plants in the town planters.

We host a free Mail-order free milkweed seed giveaway, engaging many local towns and communities along with out of region schools, towns, and organizations that wish to have either locally harvest Asclepias Incarnata, Tuberosa, or Ovalifolia seeds shipped to them as long as they provide us with a pre-stamped and addressed envelope mailed to PO BOX 1017, MELITA, MB R0M 1L0.

We have sold over 10 plants this season of Asclepias Tuberosa (Hello Yellow Variant) this year, but over 12 envelopes of Milkweed seeds have been sent out.

Same as above, we host a year round native seed giveaway by mail order.

We collected and mailed out Asclepias Tuberosa, Incarnata, and Ovilofolia.

Many rural school organizations and Bee City Brandon we will be working with to increase Monarch Habitat using our locally gathered seed inventory.

We have provided free Zoom presentations for classrooms across the Canadian Prairies for any classes interested in learning about Monarch Butterflies, we have also provided late season Monarchs in 3rd or 4th instar stage to classrooms to learn about the life cycle of Monarchs and hosted an in person presentation to Melita Early Learning Center about Monarchs and release 10 Monarch Butterflies in September.

We partnered with our local gardening group to plant Butterfly Milkweed in our town planters on Main street, along with working with local farmers and garden enthusiasts to identify places where milkweed would be suitable to grow, or leave growing if it is already established. We have also started identifying local native nectar yielding plants that are pollinator favorites and have gathered seeds from them to try and grow the next year, some of these seeds include Golden Rod, Blazing Star, Purple Coneflower, and Wild Bergamot.
