As a result of a delegation by residents Penny Poole and Patti Wallace, Council unanimously challenged me to make the Mayors Monarch Pledge. I'm very happy to make this Pledge. This comes a few years after A. J. Baker students asked for property to plant Monarch Way Stations around the township. Zorra is an environmentally conscious community, are good stewards of our natural environment and we protect our environment by valuing our natural assets and using our resources wisely. So, as with so many other issues Zorra speaks not only through words and commitments, but through actions: by doing our part. I'm happy to say that of the 29 Action Items possible Council chose to fulfill 14, AND that other Action Items be considered for next year's renewal of the Pledge. - Mayor Marcus Ryan

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. In April 2020, two Zorra residents (Penny Poole and Patti Wallace) presented a delegation to Zorra Council challenging Mayor Ryan to sign the Mayors Monarch Butterfly Pledge and support the project. Furthermore, the Township of Zorra has identified through our strategic goals that "We are an environmentally conscious community and are good stewards of our natural environment". Supporting the monarch butterflies and their habitat aligns with this goal.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

The information on the NWF website about Monarch Butterflies has been extremely helpful with our social media campaign to promote awareness. The Township has used information found on the NWF website, as well as images to help spread awareness. It would be helpful if there were sample education program documents on the website, especially documents that could be distributed at the local schools in Zorra to promote awareness and involvement in the monarch butterfly campaign.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

The Township of Zorra Council passed a resolution to complete 14 action items for the Mayors Monarch Butterfly Pledge. Nine (9) action items were completed in 2021 and the Township has plans to complete the remaining five (5) action items in 2022. The remaining action items will require more community involvement and participation.

The Township of Zorra's mowing operations during summer months were limited to 5 metres from road edge, which allowed native prairie and plants to thrive in uncut areas of the road allowance.

The Township of Zorra posted bi-weekly social media posts (Facebook and Twitter) during the spring/summer season to encourage residents to plant pollinators, including education on what plants are beneficial for monarchs in this area. The social media posts included

links to pollinator websites, monarch websites, and the Mayor's Monarch Butterfly Pledge website.

In 2021, a community garden group was founded through the Zorra Recreation Advisory Committee and planted gardens in the villages Embro and Harrinton in Zorra Township. The gardens included native pollinator species. For 2022, ground work is to be completed for pollinator garden project in two Zorra Township parks (North Park and Lions River Park) in partnership with the Thamesford Lions Club and Upper Thames River Conservation Authority.

The Township of Zorra is working with the Upper Thames River Conservation Authority (UTRCA) to help with several of the action items for the Mayors' Monarch Butterfly Pledge, including general support for monarch butterfly conservation. The Township will also working with the UTRCA to establish two (2) pollinator gardens in our community in the spring of 2022. The Township of Zorra has also informed the Zorra Recreation Advisory Committee of the Township's efforts to support butterfly conservation efforts, which resulted in additional plants for monarch butterflies at the community gardens in Zorra Township.

The Township of Zorra had a Phragmites infestation, which resulted in aggressive mowing operations to combat the infestation. The mowing operations began in 2019 and will continue until control is established. There is approximately 2 acres of land within the road allowance in Zorra Township that are infested with Phragmites.
