Pledge Summary

As a result of a delegation by residents Penny Poole and Patti Wallace, Council unanimously challenged me to make the Mayors' Monarch Butterfly Pledge. I'm very happy to. This comes a few years after A.J. Baker students asked for property to plant Monarch Way Stations around the Township. Zorra is an environmentally conscious community, are good stewards of our natural environment and we protect our environment by valuing our natural assets and using our resources wisely. So, as with so many other issues, Zorra speaks not only through words and commitments, but through actions: by doing our part. I'm happy to say that of the 29 action items possible, Zorra Council has chosen to fulfill 14. Nine of the items were completed in 2021 and the remaining five will be completed in 2022.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Engage with developers, planners, landscape architects, and other community leaders and organizers engaged in planning processes to identify opportunities to create monarch habitat.
- Create a community-driven educational conservation strategy, initiative, or practice that focuses on and benefits local, underserved residents.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Launch or maintain an outdoor education program(s) (e.g., at schools, after-school programs, community centers and groups) that builds awareness and creates habitat by engaging students, educators, and the community in planting native milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Schoolyard Habitats program and Monarch Mission curriculum).

Township staff worked with residents, Patti Wallace and Penny Poole, to develop several different project ideas for Zorra's schools, including an educational brochure for classes and monarch butterfly presentations. The Upper Thames River Conservation Authority (UTRCA) conducted presentations at the Township of Zorra elementary schools in the spring of 2022 to educate the students on monarch butterflies. The UTRCA presenters read a story (with the younger kids), acted out the monarch life cycle, dressed a volunteer up as a monarch, and played a migration game. We also talked about threats to monarchs and how planting native flowers could help.

The Upper Thames River Conservation Authority presented to 16 classes throughout the 3 schools (Zorra Highland Park School, Thamesford Public School, and AJ Baker Public School) in Zorra Township.

The Township of Zorra has been promoting the use of native plants, shrubs, and trees in Zorra landscaping, as well as community garden projects. The Thamesford Lions Club and Girls Guides planted a pollinator garden at North Park in Thamesford using native plants. The Township also worked with the Upper Thames River Conservation Authority on two pollinator gardens in Zorra Township in spring 2022.

Please describe the community art project that was implemented in your community and how it contributed to cultural awareness and recognition (e.g., number of art installations, type of art).

A monarch butterfly mural was painted on the side of the washrooms building at Thamesford South Park. The mural is pollinator and monarch themed to promote awareness of conservation efforts. The mural opened on Victoria Day weekend in 2022. Township staff worked with Unity Charity, a national non-profit organization that uses Hip Hop art forms to promote resilience and well-being among youth, to connect with a mural artist named Renier, who is experienced in not only mural painting, but community engagement initiatives. The Township also worked with the local community festival organizers from the Calithumpian Committee to team up and leverage the existing public participation in the Victoria Day weekend events. Dozens of people attended the event over the course of the mural painting.

The Township has contacted developers, as well as planning staff, regarding creating monarch habitat in the Township. During the pre-consultation stage of any subdivision proposal, staff will recommend that developers in the Township consider using native and nectar-producing plants for landscaping where applicable, and to include such in landscape plans provided to the Township during the application phase.
