Sugar Land is a city in Central Texas with a population of roughly 118,000. The city has 9 miles of Brazos River Corridor and is home to more than 2,000 acres of parks and open space. Mayor Joe R. Zimmerman of Sugar Land, TX has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with their signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the city.

Two primary organizations: City of Sugar Land Parks and Recreation, Keep Sugar Land Beautiful

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.

City of Sugar Land Parks and Recreation modified the mowing map of Brazos River Park to reduce large areas of 45-time a year mowing to twice a year for pollinator meadows. Please see attached Brazos River Park Mowing Map. Schedule F is twice a year for wildflower meadows. City of Sugar Land Parks and Recreation collaborated with Keep Sugar Land Beautiful, and won \$10,154.60 of Pollinator Meadow Grant from CenterPoint Energy. We organized eight seeding events with volunteers to from Mid-October to the beginning of December to install 85 lbs. of wildflower seeds in Brazos River Park. The seeds include 17 lbs. of milkweed seeds. Attached please find the seed list we purchased using the grant and a photo of one of the volunteer events.

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

The City of Sugar Land has a butterfly garden at the Sugar Land Memorial Park (29°33'44.1"N 95°38'35.9"W). It is part of the Brazos River Corridor, and in the Monarch migration southern gateway before the monarchs fly to Mexico for winter. It takes up about 2,300 sf of land next to a lake and loop trail. The official address for the park is 15300 University Blvd, Sugar Land, TX 77479. The garden can be reached walking to the left side of the park not far off from the parking lot. Here, individuals will see numerous milkweeds and pollinator plants that we have planted in an effort to assist the monarch butterfly habitat preservation. Our garden is tended to weekly and is kept up to par by our city's generous volunteers that are overseen by staff. There is currently no irrigation system in place at the butterfly garden. The plants are currently watered by a windmill that draws water from an underground source. Our volunteers also purchased water pipes and made a makeshift watering system. Two of our volunteers have received the "Volunteer of the Year" award from our mayor and continue to make a change in their community. At the garden, we monitor the full monarch life cycle from the egg to adult. These surveys allow us to become more knowledgeable in our work and further continue to help the butterflies. Our garden is also right next to a popular jogging loop trail by the lake that causes great interactions between volunteers and city residents. Besides being a shelter for monarch butterflies, our garden provides great opportunities for high school students to do volunteer work and does great in assisting mental health- especially during the pandemic. The city also has a pollinator plant meadow at our Brazos River Park. The official location for this park is 18427 Southwest Fwy, Sugar Land, TX 77479.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

Over the last five years, we have collaborated with Monarch Gateway, Student Conservation Association, Keep Sugar Land Beautiful, Houston Wilderness and numerous volunteers to establish and maintain this garden.
