## Pledge Summary

Sugar Land is a city in Central Texas with a population of roughly 111,000. The city has 9 miles of Brazos River Corridor and is home to more than 2,000 acres of parks and open space. Mayor Joe R. Zimmerman of Sugar Land, TX has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with their signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the city.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Initiate or support community science (or citizen science) efforts that help monitor monarch migration and health.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

### Communications and Convening

- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

We want to do our part in helping pollinators thrive and continue building a sustainable environment.

We are fortunate to have several engaged high school groups that volunteer planting, weeding and surveying our butterfly garden and pollinator meadows. Grants or financial support for us to buy milkweed seeds would be very helpful.

We had an interview with a local news source, which covers all communities including low-income communities and communities of color. We have a lot of volunteers and student workers from communities of color. We engage them in pollinator habitat-related tasks and inform them about the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program.

Earlier this year we added a butterfly garden outside of City Hall Annex Building. And we worked with two scouts to expand the Memorial Park Butterfly Garden this fall. We continue to work with city staff, residents and volunteers to find more ways to add pollinator components to city facilities.

We collaborated with Monarch Joint Venture to identify the pollinator sites to monitor the pollinator plants and Monarch Butterflies. Once per month, we complete the reports and upload to the Monarch Joint Venture monitoring platform. We partner with Monarch Joint Venture, engaged volunteers from a local high school and other city residents who are interested in participating.

Butterfly Garden at Sugar Land Memorial Park (15300 University Blvd, Sugar Land, TX 77479) and the planting beds at City Hall Annex (10405 Corporate Drive, Sugar Land, TX, 77478). The Butterfly Garden at Memorial Park is part of the Brazos River Corridor, and connected with more than 1000 acres of continuous parks and open space along Brazos River. Texas is a gateway of the Monarch fly way before they fly to Mexico. The pollinator habitat in Texas is important to monarch population. In 2022, we not only keep maintaining the butterfly garden, but also worked with two eagle scouts to expand the butterfly garden by another 900 square feet. Parks staff installed two rain barrels to assist with irrigation of the garden. One of the eagle scouts extended the pvc pipes from the Windmill so that it is easier to water the plants in the expansion area. Parks staff also planted wildflower seeds there. The plants at City Hall Annex Building planters died of a bad freeze. Parks staff redesigned the planting beds with pollinator plants, and added wildflower seeds to transfer a typical manicured planting bed to a pollinator garden.

Volunteers, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and other high school volunteer groups.

We identified mowed areas in the parks system to be pollinator meadows so that we could reduce the mowing schedule from 48 times per year to 2-3 times per year. We have been working with Keep Sugar Land Beautiful, Houston Wilderness, volunteers, and Boy/Girl Scouts working on their Eagle Scout projects to install wildflower seeds or pollinator plants in those areas. Additionally, in the park planting beds, we gradually add milkweeds and native nectar plants such as the American Basketflower, Scarlet Sage, Turk's Cap, American Beauty Berry, and Mistflower when the budget allows. This fall we are also adding approximately 100lbs. pollinator flower seeds in the parks and open space.
