## Pledge Summary

The City of College Park, Maryland is located just north of Washington D.C and south of Baltimore, MD. with a population of about 30,000. It is home to the University of Maryland, College Park campus. College Park has become a Bee City USA affiliate in 2021, and has a committee dedicated to the conservation & protection of pollinators. The Bee City committee is working on public education information to increase the awareness of the plight of pollinators, especially in our urban area and is discussing several initiatives to engage residents in creating pollinator gardens at their homes. The committee is also exploring partnerships with other nearby jurisdictions to create pollinator corridors in the metropolitan area.

A mural was commissioned by 4 local entities, College Park University Partnership, City of College Park, Prince George's County, and the Downtown College Park Merchants Association, designed & painted by local artists on the side of a building on Route 1 in the downtown business district to increase awareness about the endangered Checkerspot butterfly species in Maryland. The mural includes the mature butterfly, a chrysalis and its preferred host plant the White Turtlehead. The mural also includes the Maryland state flower, the Black eyed Susan and a Terrapin turtle, the University of Maryland mascot.

Due to Covid pandemic, local milk weed seed was collected by a Bee City committee member from a neighborhood park and prepared for packaging and distribution. Seed pack labels were created by the Bee City secretary and another Bee City committee member affixed the labels to the seed packs and disseminated the seed packs at little free libraries in College Park

**Please describe the maintenance schedule for these planted areas.**

The newly seeded planting was prepared by volunteers by removing existing grassy vegetation by raking and loosening the soil surface. A commercially prepared pollinator friendly partial shade roadside mix was spread over the soil surface and covered with a thin layer of compost, then overseeded with a cover of rye seed. The area will be marked to prevent mowing and allowed to grow undisturbed. Plant stalks and seed heads will be left to overwinter to provide habitat. Educational signage will be installed to identify the planting and describe the cultural practices.
