Cedar Park has two Community Gardens with active volunteer groups and Master Gardeners. These groups are Monarch Champions and conduct public outreach at quarterly meetings.

Right of Way mowing is deferred during the months of April, May and June in areas of Monarch habitat. Most notably along Blockhouse Drive, our largest area of Monarch habitat.

**Please describe the milkweed seed collection and propagation effort that you hosted.**

Parks and Rec Staff collected Milkweed seed pods from the ROW of Blockhouse Drive during the month of June. The pods were collected when mature but not yet fully opened. The pods were seeded at the Discovery Well Cave Preserve which is an area of 106 acres of habitat preserve for endangered species (*Rhadine persephone*) with very minimal mowing. The photo shows the preserve area with new Milkweed (from previous year) growing along the single track trail.

This task was achieved with our Adopt-a Park Program. The residents in the Park Place neighborhood adopted the park and the City of Cedar Park provided the equipment (Uprooter tool) for the group to remove hundreds of invasive Ligustrum.
