We have implemented new initiatives at 2 of our parks, including Town Center Park and Park Place Park. Initiatives included installation of pollinator gardens and deferred mowing practices.

We engaged with the neighbors of Park Place park to plant a pollinator garden at the park. We also worked with a local Girl Scout troop and the Williamson County Native Plant rescue project to plant pollinator plants and milkweed at Town Center park.

We engaged with the Cedar Park, Parks and Recreation Department Maintenance division and the Public Works Department, Streets Division, as well as the Stormwater Management Department.

Parks and recreation, along with Public Works, made concerted efforts this year to defer mowing during milkweed season. Additionally, deferred mowing signage has been installed at several city locations including parks, detention ponds and right of ways.

We worked with the Williamson County native Plant Rescue, and the Hill Country Bloomers, a local gardening club. Along with our own community garden members.

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and their monarch butterfly conservation efforts.

We worked with the Native plant rescue to plant a new pollinator garden at the Recreation Center. We held several gardening classes with our community garden members and the public on the benefits of gardening overall, but also for proper plant identification to avoid spraying or removing healthy and necessary plants. The Hill Country Bloomers participated in our adopt a park program in which they assisted with invasive species removal.

We worked with the neighbors of Park Place Park to develop a new pollinator garden. We also worked with them to develop a deferred mowing program in a nearby Riparian Zone to re-establish the zone and to allow for milkweed and other native plants to thrive. We also

established a small "no-mow" zone for the continued development of native wildflowers, pollinator plants and milkweed.

Please describe the milkweed seed collection and propagation effort that you hosted.

Parks and Rec Staff collected Milkweed seed pods from the ROW of Blockhouse Drive during the month of June. The pods were collected when mature but not yet fully opened. The pods were seeded at the Discovery Well Cave Preserve which is an area of 106 acres of habitat preserve for endangered species (*Rhadine persephone*) with very minimal mowing. The photo shows the preserve area with new Milkweed (from previous year) growing along the single track trail.

We expanded our existing invasive species removal at Park Place Park by expanding the removal into the Riparian Zone that runs through the park. Neighborhood volunteers assisted in the removal of several invasive species including ragweed.

September 2024. We developed a no spray policy at near our Recreation Center for newly planted pollinator beds. We also continue to have a no chemical policy at our community gardens.
