### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

The City is primarily creating habitat at parks, canyons, and open space areas (Tecolote Canyon, Otay Valley Regional Park, Villa Monserate Park, Tierrasanta Open Space, etc.). Residents and partners are also creating gardens at homes and schools.

San Diego's updated Parks Master Plan and related investment priorities are shifting emphasis to underserved communities for parks and open space investments. Monarch and pollinator habitat is being incorporated into new dedicated regional parks and neighborhood park improvements in designated communities of concern.
