We will be working with Libraries Dept to estimate how many seeds have been distributed and what plants were most popular.

Signs are spread across a handful of locations including City Hall, Zoro Garden in Balboa Park, and other community and regional parks with pollinator habitat. These are City signs that have a mix between site-specific information and general commentary about the importance of pollinators and the types of habitat that support them.

Countless environmental groups, youth organizations, and wildlife advocates have been involved in the creation of the City's recent Park Master Plan update, revised Climate Action Plan, and first-ever Climate Resilience Plan, all of which touch on pollinator habitat.
