The City of Palm Desert is a California city nestled in the heart of the Coachella Valley. With a diverse demographic, 362 days of sunshine and a population of approximately 53,000, Palm Desert is home to many beautiful parks, community gardens and other outdoor activities. Palm Desert is also home to The Living Desert Zoo & Botanical Gardens, which puts conservation into action by promoting environmental sustainability, including species preservation of many desert plants and animals, including butterflies. Mayor Karina Quintanilla of Palm Desert, California has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge and looks forward to continuing the City of Palm Desert's partnership with the Living Desert Zoo and Gardens to engage residents in building more pollinator habitats throughout the City.

## Action Items Committed for 2024

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

**Please describe the community art project that was implemented in your community and how it contributed to cultural awareness and recognition (e.g., number of art installations, type of art).**

The community art project implemented in Palm Desert for the 2024 Mayors' Monarch Pledge involved the purchase and installation of a park bench made from recycled materials. The bench is fabricated from retired wind turbine parts and pieces, and was installed at Civic Center Park, the City's largest and most popular park. The City's Landscape and Public Art divisions collaborated to release a call for artists to wrap the bench in a vinyl coating to create a public art display. The Palm Desert Cultural Art Committee considered the art entries at its July 10, 2024 meeting. The selected art features a colorful butterfly design was installed on October 28, 2024.

The demonstration garden is located within Civic Center Park at the heart of the City of Palm Desert. Civic Center Park is one of the most popular parks in the Coachella Valley

and is frequented by residents and visitors alike. The garden is located along a walking path and directional signage has been placed throughout the park to make the garden easy to locate.

The Living Desert Zoo and Gardens collaborated with the City on establishing the pollinator garden at Civic Center Park. Their website is linked on a QR Code that is on a sign at the pollinator garden so community members can learn about how to create a native garden at home.
