The City of Palm Desert, located in the heart of California's Coachella Valley, is a vibrant community known for its diverse population, 365 days of sunshine, and a population of approximately 53,000. Palm Desert offers a wealth of outdoor activities, including beautiful parks, community gardens, and other recreational spaces. It is also home to The Living Desert Zoo & Botanical Gardens, a leader in environmental sustainability and species conservation, including the preservation of desert plants and animals, such as butterflies. Mayor Jan Harnik of Palm Desert has committed to protecting the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge. She looks forward to continuing the City's partnership with The Living Desert Zoo & Gardens to engage residents in creating additional pollinator habitats across the city.

Please describe the community art project that was implemented in your community and how it contributed to cultural awareness and recognition (e.g., number of art installations, type of art).

The 2024 Mayors' Monarch Pledge community art project in Palm Desert centered on installing a park bench made from recycled wind turbine parts at Civic Center Park. The City's Landscape and Public Art divisions issued a call for artists, and the Cultural Arts Committee selected a vibrant butterfly-themed vinyl wrap, which was installed on October 28, 2024. After the bench was found to have been damaged in June 2025, our Special Programs Division promptly repaired and re-wrapped it, demonstrating the City's commitment not only to creating meaningful public art projects but also to maintaining them.

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

Demonstrating its commitment to monarch butterfly conservation, the City planted milkweed in strategic locations, including the entryway to the Council Chamber. Recently, several monarch larvae were spotted on these plants—an encouraging sign of the program's success. Over the next nine to fourteen days, these caterpillars will undergo metamorphosis, helping increase the monarch population throughout Palm Desert. Later this year, the new Asclepias plantings near the Guadalupe Community Gardens thrived—and they are already attracting a variety of pollinators. Bees are actively visiting the sages, and monarchs are taking advantage of the milkweed, further supporting our Mayors' Monarch Pledge.
