Pledge Summary

The City of Moorhead is a small city of 44,668 people in the Lake Agassiz basin. The land is prone to flooding, and some land along the Red River has been restored to native prairie or enhanced through the Urban Woods and Prairies Initiative through Audubon Great Plains. We are also working with Wildlife Forever and United Prairie Foundation on prairie plantings in two parks totaling 14 acres. We added 3 smaller pocket prairies (~300 square feet each) in 3 parks. Many residents in the community are interested in pollinator conservation.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. There is recognition within our community of the importance of pollinators and how we can take steps, individually and together, to support them. This was evident in comments received during public input for the Onward Moorhead! Comprehensive Plan. Furthermore, In a community survey completed in fall of 2022, the respondents listed "planting flowers/pollinator plants and natural lawn options" as the strategy they were most interested in pursuing as a community. Food production (gardens, keeping of chickens) and food forests also scored high.

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.

We have been working in the public works department to find ways to increase pollinator habitat. We worked with a non-profit called Wildlife Forever and the United Prairie Foundation and recieved a grant to convert about 15 acres of turf grass into prairie plants which was seeded in 2023. We have also been working with the group Resilient Moorhead, which is a task force comprised of about 21 organizations in Moorhead. Resilient

Moorhead helped fund many of the plug plants for the larger plantings. Within the city, Planning, Parks and Recreation, and Public Works have all been involved with site preparation and maintenance. Organizations such as Audubon Dakota and River Keepers helped with recruiting volunteers for the planting at Southside Regional.

Planting areas included two city buildings (700 15th Ave N and 1300 15th Ave N) and micro planting sites along Center Avenue.

City staff planted the sites at the two City buildings and MNL planted the sites along Center Avenue.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

A community survey was completed to prioritize strategies around various sustainability efforts, including natural plantings. Allowing and supporting natural planting lawns both on private and public properties scored as a high priority throughout the survey. Additional engagement included having three local experts review and provide comments on the natural lawn ordinance prior to adoption. The Moorhead Planning Commission was also engaged in the review.

Moorhead enlisted volunteers to hand cut and pull buckthorn at different parks within the city. To reduce the use of chemicals, buckthorn baggies were used to prevent potential regrowth after the buckthorn was removed. After, follow up was done to ensure any possible regrowth could be kept in check.
