## Pledge Summary

Moorhead is a city in Northwestern Minnesota with a population of approximately 45,000. Moorhead has engaged in numerous initiatives over the past several years to preserve the monarch habitat including the passage of a natural lawn ordinance, planting demonstration gardens at different city owned buildings and parks, and removing invasive species at city parks. Mayor Carlson and the City of Moorhead are committed to Mayors' Monarch Pledge for a fourth year to continue preserving the monarch habitat.

## Action Items Committed for 2024

### Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. **What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

There is recognition within our community of the importance of pollinators and how we can take steps, individually and together, to support them. This was evident in comments received during public input for the Onward Moorhead! Comprehensive Plan. Furthermore, in a community survey completed in the fall of 2022, the respondents listed "planting flowers/pollinator plants and natural lawn options" as a strategy they were most interested in pursuing as a community. Food production (gardens, keeping of chickens) and food forests also scored high. As a result of the efforts being taken, more and more Moorhead

residents are taking steps to install pollinator gardens and contribute to local food production, displaying the communities interests in full effect.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

The City of Moorhead received a Climate Action Grant from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency to convert approximately 10 acres of turf grass to pollinator landscape along the Red River Corridor. This project will be implemented in 2025.

We have been continually working with the Public Works department to find different ways to increase pollinator habitat in Moorhead. Organizations like MNL and River Keepers have assisted with the maintenance and upkeep of pollinator areas. Further, River Keepers assists with gathering volunteers to participate in planting events. Organizations/groups such as PRAIRIE, MSUM, and Grateful Community Garden received funding to create or enhance a community garden and provide outreach to garden volunteers. Within the City, Planning, Parks and Recreation, and Public Works have all been involved with site preparation and maintenance of pollinator areas.

Demonstration garden areas include two city buildings (700 15th Ave N and 1300 15th Ave N), micro planting sites along Center Avenue, and an open city lot (502 24th Ave S)
