## Pledge Summary

Moorhead is a city in Northwestern Minnesota with a population of approximately 45,000. Moorhead has engaged in numerous initiatives over the past several years to preserve the monarch habitat including the passage of a natural lawn ordinance, planting demonstration gardens at different city owned buildings and parks, revising the mosquito spraying approval process, adding signage to pollinator gardens, and removing invasive species at city parks. Mayor Carlson and the City of Moorhead are committed to Mayors' Monarch Pledge for a fifth year to continue preserving the monarch habitat.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

There is recognition within our community of the importance of pollinators and how we can take steps, individually and together, to support them. This was evident in comments received during public engagement for the Onward Moorhead! Comprehensive Plan. Furthermore, in a community survey completed in the fall of 2022, the respondents listed "planting flowers/pollinator plants and natural lawn options" as a strategy they were most interested in pursuing as a community. Food production (gardens, keeping of chickens) and food forests also scored high. As a result of the efforts being taken, Moorhead residents are taking steps to install pollinator gardens and contribute to local food production.

The City of Moorhead is working on completing the implementation of a project funded by a Climate Action Grant from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency to convert approximately 10 acres of turf grass to pollinator landscape along the Red River Corridor.

Concordia College, Minnesota Native Landscapes, River Keepers, Moorhead Public Works, Moorhead Parks and Recreation , Moorhead Community Development , Minnesota State University Moorhead, Brookdale Baptist Church, Salem Evangelical Free Church, and Grateful Community Garden.

We have been continually working with the Moorhead Public Works department to find ways to increase pollinator habitat in Moorhead. Organizations like Minnesota Native Landscapes and River Keepers have assisted with the maintenance and upkeep of pollinator areas. River Keepers also assists with gathering volunteers to participate in planting events. Organizations/groups such as Salem Evangelical Free Church, Brookdale Baptist Church, Minnesota State University Moorhead, and Grateful Community Garden received funding to create or enhance a community garden and provide outreach to garden volunteers. Multiple City departments have been involved with site preparation, maintenance, and installation of pollinator areas.

Demonstration garden areas include two city buildings (700 15th Ave N and 1300 15th Ave N), micro planting sites along Center Avenue, an open city lot (502 24th Ave S), and sites throughout the Red River corridor, including 10 acres of new pollinator planting sites.

City staff, in coordination with Minnesota Native Landscapes, have been maintaining the sites.
