## Pledge Summary

Biddeford is a thriving coastal city of 22,000 residents. Situated along the Saco river, our city boasts 241 acres of public parks, nature trails, and perennial and community vegetable gardens. In year two of our Mayor's Monarch Pledge, we remain strongly committed to saving the Monarch Butterfly by increasing the amount of monarch habitat in these greenspaces, as well as in other areas of the city.

## Action Items Committed for 2022

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Convert vacant lots to monarch habitat.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Host or support a monarch butterfly festival that is accessible to all residents in the community and promotes monarch and pollinator conservation, as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Systems Change

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.
- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

Biddeford is host to RiverJam, an amazing annual summer art and music festival. A component of the festival was a community mural project led by a local artist and her student assistants. The mural is on a low wall at the foot of Hill Street, a busy connection with Main Street. The public was invited to participate in the actual mural process. The Prayer Flags have been used at our Spring Pollinator Festival and at our city's annual River Jam Festival. The pollinator signs were placed in our large community garden at Rotary Park.

We have been given initial approval to create pollinator habitat on one of the city's unused corner lots. The soil is contaminated, however, with high concentrations of lead. Next step will be to apply for federal funding through a brownfields grant to clean up the lot.

Our first annual Spring Pollinator Festival was an incredible success bringing local organizations, businesses, and folks from various cultures together. This 'FREE' event was open to the public and held in Rotary Park, our city's biggest park 70+ acres in size. The weather was perfect. All participants enjoyed the grassroots nature of it, music, cultural food tables, loads of activities from naturally dyed and screen-printed t-shirts, to starting seedlings, and making Monarch Butterfly Puppets with Bike Part Art. It was such a success that all who participated eagerly await planning for next year's festival.

For the past four years. Biddeford Community Gardens has co-hosted with McArthur Public Library the 'Biddeford Gardens' series. In October, we had held a 'Save the Monarch' event, which was well-attended. Author Rebekah Lowell spoke about the plight of the Monarch and what we can do at a local level to preserve and protect their habitat.

Biddeford Community Gardens teams up regularly with Service Works (an organization that works with teens who are required to do community service). We harvested, sorted and saved milkweed, sea holly, beebalm, and coneflower.

Biddeford Community Gardens gardeners harvested seed. The seed was then sorted and packaged by Service Works youth. We have distributed our seeds this year at the fall Fringefest, McArthur Library, and a well-attended Maker's Faire, also this fall.

Also partnered with McArthur Library on year four of our Biddeford Gardens series. They provided the public with 100 'No Mow May' signs.

This year, our city's public works department ceased mowing an approximate 5 acre parcel of land adjoining one of our city parks. The parcel has seen wild grasses and wildflowers return. During period of rain, there is an area which fills with water and pairs of Mallard ducks can be seen. Other organizations, including our public library, participated in the national No Mow May effort. The library printed signs, which were distributed widely.

Meetings held in early spring resulted in the following: Public Works, city's volunteer Adopt a Park program, and other interested city staff made the decision to remove this parcel from their weekly mowing schedule. Library and Biddeford City Departments acknowledging and promoting 'No Mow May.'

We have several pollinator-friendly gardens in and around the downtown and in our community gardens. Biddeford Community Gardens planted milkweed in the Pierson's Lane Children's Garden. Local financial institution, Biddeford Savings Bank, allowed us to plant pollinator-friendly flowers in their Main Street border garden. At our newest Biddeford Community Garden at Rotary Park, we encouraged pollinators by adding many pollinator-friendly flowers and herbs to naturally growing milkweed garden. Purple coneflower, callendula, dahlias, tulsi basil, as examples. The total area planted amounts to 1 acre or less.
