Pledge Summary

Biddeford is a beautiful city on the Saco River, with miles of coastal beaches, a developed downtown, and rolling farmland. There are 14 public parks and four community gardens in Biddeford. In 2023, the city finalized its Climate Action Plan and will be forming a Sustainability Commission spring of 2024. Since our first Mayors' Monarch Pledge in 2021, we are committed to educating the public about the importance of the Monarch Butterfly by encouraging our citizenry to mow less, reduce or end the use of pesticides and herbicides, and incorporate more native plantings in their gardens. We are increasing education in the schools through garden and arts programming. And we will hold our third annual Spring Pollinator Festival in May.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Create a community-driven educational conservation strategy, initiative, or practice that focuses on and benefits local, underserved residents.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Launch or maintain an outdoor education program(s) (e.g., at schools, after-school programs, community centers and groups) that builds awareness and creates habitat by engaging students, educators, and the community in planting native milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Schoolyard Habitats program and Monarch Mission curriculum).

- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

The NWF's Mayor's Monarch Pledge is a great way for us to stay up to date on new research about the Monarch Butterfly and on track with our commitments to do our part to protect them.

In the RP Vista photo, the hillside beyond the raised bed garden area has traditionally been mowed. For the last two years, the city has allowed this area to rewild. Throughout the field and hillside you will find goldenrod, black-eyed Susans, and other native wildflowers growing.

Master Gardener Volunteers University of New England's med students care for one of our city parks, including a flower garden that has many milkweed plants and other native wildflowers. Learning Works BLAST program (kids K-grade 4) visit our Rotary Park Community Garden and learn about the importance of pollinators, including the Monarch Butterfly. Cornerstones of Maine - a residential program for youth 18-24.

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and their monarch butterfly conservation efforts.

Through our Pierson's Lane Children's Garden, we work with certified Master Gardener Volunteers who help teach kids the basics of gardening and growing food, and the importance of pollinators, including the Monarch Butterfly. One of this year's MGV's has transformed her own gardens from traditional lawn and perennial and annual borders to a more eco-friendly native wildflower garden. The Biddeford Middle School's Garden Club planted native wildflowers, including milkweed in and around school grounds. Young adults from Cornerstones of Maine worked on an informational sign project in early spring this year, showing the various stages of the Monarch and other important pollinators. The signs were attached to the garden fence at Rotary Park Community Garden for the public to see. University of New England med students have adopted one of our city parks, which has a sizeable flower garden, which has many wildflowers and milkweed plants. They care for the garden over the school year and into summer.
