Pledge Summary

Conway, SC has an approximate population of 28,000 people, and sits in the 'Low Country' of South Carolina. One piece of its uniqueness is that it is a quiet, historic community located a mere twelve (12) miles from South Carolina's 'Grand Strand', known for the resort City of Myrtle Beach. Conway has always prided itself in being environmentally responsible. Historically, streets in Conway have been designed around our oldest residents, Live Oak trees. We have been a 'Tree City USA' for over thirty-five years. Conway's Waccamaw Park is natural in that it is an 'untouched' atmosphere. We also are developing biosweles in downtown urban parking (green) infrastructure. Your bringing to our attention the ease with which we might commit to Monarch butterflies remaining a part of the delicate balance of nature also made a decision to 'sign up' very easy.

We tilled the entire area, added some satisfactory soil and then planted on June 15, 2021. We applied a fertilizer after the germination process had occurred. We conducted weekly inspections and generated action based on the weekly conditions. We weeded as needed and made efforts to deter deer that was our biggest issues.

The city Arborist conducted three presentations to local garden groups. At each of the public speaking engagements the topic of Monarchs was discussed and future plans were made. The future action plans will take place in the spring. The garden groups are securing the plant material this month. We have also targeted areas that are low income housing and when new sidewalks are being installed we will look at the surrounding area and add a wildflower/pollinator mixture to be planted if its a good fit.

The local garden clubs are eager to be a part of this project. We have several projects within the cities current plans and they have there projects on parcels they have interest in so with this combination it gets more areas involved. We conducted two Public Engagements that monarchs was part of the agenda. One was the Camelia Garden Club and the other was the Ivy Garden Club. They are equally ambitious to implement the efforts to help with this project..
