Prairie Village is a city in Johnson County, Kansas located in the heart of the Kansas City Metro region. With more than a dozen parks, green space is important to the City and it's more than 22,000 residents. Mayor Eric Mikkelson, with the support and guidance of the Prairie Village Environmental Committee, is taking the Monarch Pledge again in 2021, reaffirming the City's commitment to saving monarchs and other pollinators.

Deep Roots organization and Go Green 2022 event

Please describe the milkweed seed collection and propagation effort that you hosted.

Propagation was completed through the distribution of native seed balls at 2 community events. Event #1: Distribution of seed balls at a native plant sale in Prairie Village. This event was a partnership between and the City of Prairie Village and Deep Roots (<https://deeproots.org>). Event #2: Distribution of seed balls at a county-wide environmental fair (Johnson County, which includes the City of Prairie Village). At both events, seed balls

were distributed for free to attendees. At event #1, approximately 100 Asclepias tuberosa and 100 Rudbeckia subtomentosa seed balls were distributed. At event #2, approximately 300 Asclepias tuberosa and 275 Rudbeckia subtomentosa seed balls were distributed. Handout was provided to attendees with information about the species and planting instructions. *INCLUDE ATTACHMENT of seed information
