Pledge Summary

Prairie Village is a city in Johnson County, Kansas located in the heart of the Kansas City Metro region. With more than a dozen parks, green space is important to the City and it's more than 22,000 residents. Mayor Eric Mikkelson, with the support and guidance of the Prairie Village Environmental Committee, is taking the Monarch Pledge again in 2023, reaffirming the City's commitment to saving monarchs and other pollinators.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

The Prairie Village Voice is the newsletter for the City of Prairie Village. It is mailed to every business and residence in Prairie Village and is also available electronically. It is published every two months and allows residents and businesses to keep up-to-date with significant

events and activities in the city. It is distributed to approximately 11,800 households and businesses in Prairie Village. Two articles were published in 2023 promoting native habitats for monarchs. Articles included 'County funding available to help residents build rain gardens, support pollinators, reduce erosion' in the March/April 2023 edition, page 6, and 'Environmental Committee encourages sustainable lawns' in the May/June 2023 edition, page 6.

This is an ongoing project. The Mayor's Monarch Pledge committee has been in communication with a representative from the Johnson County Parks and Recreation Department to determine how best to move forward with adding native plants to one of our largest city parks. The subcommittee is currently preparing a formal letter to submit to Johnson County Parks and Recreation in support adding native plants to the park.

Nineteen Homeowners Associations were contacted. Five responded.

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions implemented for mowing and maintenance programs.

Nineteen letters written by the Mayors Monarch Pledge (MMP) committee were sent to HOA presidents in Prairie Village. The letter describes our Mayor's commitment to the Mayors Monarch Pledge and expressed a desire for the MMP committee to partner with HOA's to encourage residents to become involved in monarch conservation, including the planting of host and nectar plants for monarchs. Out of the 19 letters sent to HOA presidents, we received five responses. Four HOAs thanked us/acknowledged receipt of

our letter. One HOA expressed interest in having the MMP committee speak at one of their HOA meetings. (A date has not yet been set to speak at the HOA meeting).

How many plants were sold and/or given away at your event?

Between two events, approximately 550 seed balls of *Asclepias tuberosa* and 200 *Asclepias incarnata* plants were distributed.

How many people attended your event?

700

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to host the event?

Event #1: For over 25 years, Prairie Village has held Village Fest, an annual July 4th event. During Village Fest 2023, the city sponsored the giveaway of 200 *Asclepias incarnata* plants and approximately 150 *Asclepias tuberosa* seed balls (individuals who accepted seed balls were also given soil, a biodegradable pot, and planting instructions). Other activities at this event included the presence of Master Naturalist to provide native plant and monarch education, a community member brought live monarch chrysalises for display and education, a community member brought live honey bees for display and education, a butterfly making craft was offered to children, and a large monarch photo prop was constructed and displayed. See attached photos. Event #2: Go Green Event, held September 23, 2023 at a neighboring city within our county. This event was a partnership between a few of the neighboring cities of Prairie Village, Johnson County Kansas, and local community organizations. At this event, Prairie Village supplied volunteers for the Go Green Event planning committee and volunteers for the event. Approximately 400 seed balls containing *Asclepias tuberosa* seeds were distributed to event attendees. The event was advertised in The Village Voice September/October 2023 edition, page 7

The MMP committee had discussed with Prairie Village Public Works about the possibility of the city adding pollinator signage to the native gardens that the city maintains, but no decisions have been made yet by Public Works.
