Pledge Summary

The City of Prairie Village is a first-ring suburb near the heart of the Kansas City metropolitan area. With a population of 22,000, Prairie Village preserves the ambiance of a village with the livability of a neighborhood. The "village" lifestyle is enhanced by quality education, a variety of housing options, recreation and local commerce in pedestrian friendly centers. Since 2021, the City of Prairie Village, under the guidance of the Prairie Village Environmental Committee, has participated in the National Wildlife Federation's Mayors' Monarch Pledge in an effort to support monarch and pollinator conservation.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. electronically. It is published every two months and allows residents and businesses to keep up to date with significant events and activities in the city. It is distributed to approximately 11,500 households and businesses in Prairie Village. One article was published in 2025 promoting native habitats for monarchs. What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to host the event?

1) For over 25 years, Prairie Village has held Village Fest, an annual Fourth of July event. During the event, the Prairie Village Environmental Committee had a designated event tent, with activities to support of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge. 1) The city sponsored the giveaway of approximately 150 *Asclepias tuberosa* seed balls (individuals who accepted seed balls were also given soil, a biodegradable pot, and planting instructions). Participants, who were primarily children, had the opportunity to make their own seed ball or take a pre-made seed ball. 2) A children's craft activity was offered that promoted native gardening and pollinator habitats. Over 200 paper bookmarks embedded with native plant seeds were distributed. The children could color the bookmarks and then take the bookmarks home to plant. The seed varieties embedded within the bookmarks included: Jacobs Ladder, Spider Milkweed, Sweet Black Eyed Susan, Orange Butterfly Milkweed, Wild Bergamot, Lavender Hyssopp, Purple Coneflower, Smooth Aster, Indian Blanket, Prairie Coneflower, Mexican Hat, and Lace-Leaf Coreopsis. 3) Other activities at the Village Fest event included tabling by Johnson County Master Naturalists who provided native plant and monarch education, a beekeeper who brought a beehive with live bees for display and education, a community member who brought live monarch chrysalises for display and education, and a large monarch photo prop was displayed. 2) The Prairie Village Environmental Committee offered free native seeds to attendees of two native plant sales held in the parking lot of the Prairie Village City Hall (organized by Deep Roots KC). Seeds offered included Sweet Black Eyed Susan, White False Indigo, Orange Butterfly Weed, Green Milkweed, Red Swamp Milkweed, and White Swamp Milkweed. Approximately 375 seed packets were given out between both events.

This action item is in progress. The Mayors' Monarch Pledge sub-committee is in the process of developing a plan to expand pesticide-free parks in the city from one park to two parks, and to incorporate a registered Monarch Waystation in the current pesticide-free park. Once the plan is complete, the committee plans to engage the city Public Works department in a discussion about how to work towards implementation of these goals.

1) The Johnson County Master Naturalists tabled at our city's annual Fourth of July event, Village Fest. Their display included information about monarchs and native plants. 2) The City of Prairie hosted two native plant sales organized by Deep Roots KC, a local nonprofit organization whose mission is to promote the use of conservation and native plants to support a healthy planet. Sales were held on April 12th from 10 am – 2 pm and September 13th from 10 am – 2 pm. The event took place in the parking lot of the Prairie Village City Hall and was advertised via social media, the Deep Roots KC newsletter and website, and The Prairie Village Voice city newsletter. Multiple vendors sold native plants, and during the fall sale, Johnson County Stormwater offered discounts to Johnson County residents who purchased native trees that support wildlife and stormwater management. The Prairie Village Environmental Committee tabled the events and offered free native seeds to attendees and provided literature about planting and maintaining a monarch waystation. In conjunction with the native plant sales, Deep Roots KC sponsored native garden tours of Kansas City area residents, including the yards of several Prairie Village residents. The tour enabled community members to tour the properties of residents to see examples of how to incorporate native plants, shrubs, and trees into private property landscaping.
