We removed/cleared invasives from a 1.50 acre area from a coastal prairie that is right at 50 acres in total size. This was at a City Park Property.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

We continue to remove and clear invasive plants from our City park properties. This has mainly involved cutting down Chinese Tallow trees, and then coming in at a later date with a forestry mulcher to grind down the stumps and leftover material that remains from when we cut them down.

much, but there are many milkweed plants/stalks that remain and will come back in the Spring of 2026.
