Pledge Summary

Cuero, Texas a community of 8256 located in South Central Texas, is proud of its heritage, its history, and its hospitality. The community's citizens are active in its landscaping efforts in parks and other public places. The citizens, once informed of the decline of the monarch population, began planting pollinator plants in private places. Students at elementary and junior high studied the monarch through Cuero and prepared posters sharing important facts about butterflies, monarch's in particular. In addition students built small native gardens at their schools to help with migration. Mayor Meyer encourages citizens to plant natives and other pollinator plants in their gardens. Mayor Meyer has signed the Monarch Pledge for the last five years.

Action Items Committed for 2022
