The sign is located at the Village Hall in our large Monarch/pollinator garden that surrounds the front door entrance. This area has been enhanced to provide habitat which supports the Monarch Butterfly migration and population. In particular, milkweed plant has been established which plays a key role in the monarch life cycle. Milkweed is the only plant the monarch caterpillar will eat, therefore the adult female monarch relies on the availability of milkweed on which to lay her eggs. Planting milkweed also helps bees and other

pollinators by providing them an additional source of nectar. Do not cut vegetation or spray with chemicals.
