Pledge Summary

In Spring of 2016, the City of Lewisville took on The National Wildlife Federation's Mayor's Monarch Pledge in order to protect the Texas State Insect, the monarch butterfly. Its 2500-mile migration slices through the heart of the City, bringing an immense amount of joy to all of our citizens. Over the last decade however, as butterfly populations have declined, witnessing the Great Monarch Migration has become difficult, to say the least. In order to support this iconic insect's journey through North Texas, the City of Lewisville will support community education, innovate the field of parkland management, construct pollinator habitat, and bring our citizens together for events that provide a butterfly's eye view of how pollinators impact our daily lives.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Host or support a monarch butterfly festival that is accessible to all residents in the community and promotes monarch and pollinator conservation, as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

The 1.7 of the acres mentioned above consists of broadcasting in Timber Creek Greenbelt, adding five new pocket pollinator gardens at Hedrick House, and installing a butterfly way station in a street median. 130 of those acres are places that have been taken off the city's mowing schedule and converted to 33 sites for pollinator habitat.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

We have hosted a variety of outreach events that engage our underserved population. One example is our Mariposas event that celebrates the monarch and welcomes the LatinX community.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

As a community that believes in protecting and connecting with the natural world, we were already committed o many of the action items in the program. Signing up for the pledge

was a great way for us to gain access to new resources and show our commitment to preserving the monarch butterfly.

Please describe the details of your monarch butterfly festival and how you ensured the event was accessible by all residents in the community (e.g., events, length, notable successes, outreach, location).

The 4th annual bilingual Mariposas Butterfly Festival was held on 5/5/2021 and welcomed 50 families with a Evening Primrose plant giveaway and information from vendors about conservation efforts across the state. This year we partnered with Keep Lewisville Beautiful to double our footprint and reach a new audience. Local Vendors included the Native Plant Society of Texas, Keep Lewisville Beautiful, Texas Discovery Gardens, Coppell Amazon Fulfillment, and the Texas Woman's University Dr. Bettye Meyer's Butterfly Garden. We hope to reach 500 bilingual people with the same resources at the 2022 festival.

Where are the medians, roadsides and public rights-of-way? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible, or describe the location)

Monarch butterfly conservation practices were incorporated into the 2018 Parks Master Plan. In 2017 The City was awarded Texas Department of Transportation's Green Ribbon Grant in order to make landscape improvements to the medians at FM 407 and SH 121 Business roads. In April 2019, the first of the 5 actively managed butterfly way stations was

installed at 1367 North Valley Parkway. In 2021, 6 more areas were established. This number includes the total of 33 way stations being installed over the next three years.

No mow zones have been established and crew leaders regularly monitor the health of the plants. Volunteer events help with managing and removing invasive species. All of our gardens have a calendar of events that includes mowing and re-seeding.
