The Village of Bloomingdale is located in DuPage County, Illinois, about 25 miles west of downtown Chicago with a population of approximately 22,000 people. The Village has been named a Tree City, USA for over 25 years and is committed to participating in environmental initiatives that help with monarch and pollinator conservation.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. - Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.

Village of Bloomingdale Public Works Department planted in multiple areas on the village owned open space, and further, went on to certify them as "official" Waystations through MonarchWatch.org and included signage. Included along with milkweed are many thistle plants. No chemicals are sprayed in the open space so the environment is perfect to foster their growth. Additionally a space has been designated to be created as a Butterfly Garden/Monarch Waystation at the area next to our Village Hall, which will take place in the Spring of 2023. Finally, there is a Monarch Waystation behind the Village Hall and Public Library.

The Village of Bloomingdale now has designated areas as Monarch Waystations, which provides milkweed and nectar plants for monarchs throughout their annual cycle of reproduction and migration. Look for these signs located in the open space near the two ponds. Additionally, a space to be designated as a Butterfly Garden/Monarch Waystation at the Village Hall. Finally, there is a Monarch Waystation behind the Village Hall and Bloomingdale Public Library with designated signage.
