Pledge Summary

The Village of Bloomingdale is located in DuPage County, Illinois, about 25 miles west of downtown Chicago with a population of approximately 22,000 people. The Village participates in the DuPage Monarch Project, has been named a Tree City, USA for over 25 years and is committed to participating in environmental initiatives that help with monarch and pollinator conservation.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We have involved our Public Works Team to assist in these efforts, in particular with the village hall space. The project was paired with another endeavor of creating a Rock Snake that "protects" our butterfly garden. The rock snake was created by families with children painting rocks at the library. This really expanded our audience and awareness to the library staff, the local families and especially children, who can be the generation that could potentially make the biggest impact.

The Village of Bloomingdale now has designated areas as Monarch Waystations, which provides milkweed and nectar plants for monarchs throughout their annual cycle of reproduction and migration. Look for these signs located in the open space near the two ponds. Additionally, In 2023, we designated a public space, installed and maintained a Monarch Waystation/Butterfly Garden that also houses a Rock Garden Snake with rocks painted by the community to also heighten awareness of the garden, located on the side of our Village Hall. We also have a table and seating nearby for the community to enjoy. Finally, Bloomingdale Public Library and village owned Open Spaces as well as a Public Park and off of parking lot. have educational signage. Finally, there is a Monarch Waystation behind the Village Hall and Bloomingdale Public Library with designated signage.

Our rock snake took up residence in Bloomingdale, wrapping around the recently installed Butterfly Garden, located just north of the Village Hall upstairs entrance, adding charm and lots of color! The Village collaborated with the Bloomingdale Public Library to kick off this project; the library hosted an opportunity for those interested to drop by and paint a rock to give our community rock snake life! The snake surrounds the garden and consists of rocks of all shapes and sizes hand painted and sealed by residents. The goals included bringing a sense of community as well as to bring awareness to the Village Hall Butterfly Garden. Discussion took place that involved the purpose of the garden.
