Outreach efforts focus on making pollinator education and habitat building activities accessible to all residents of the Municipality. This includes offering free workshops, sharing resources through the public library and community centre, and promoting pollinator friendly practices through the local school. Pollinator gardens and habitat projects are located in publicly visible and accessible spaces so that all residents can benefit and learn from them. By integrating the Monarch Pledge into existing community programs and partnerships, we work to increase awareness, participation, and environmental stewardship among groups that may have fewer opportunities to engage in conservation initiatives.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

Whitestone Council wants to ensure its residents are aware of pollinator friendly practices. We also aim to ensure that pollinator gardens and habitat projects increase awareness, participation, and environmental stewardship.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

Publicly available pollinator-conservation toolkits, guidance from the Mayors' Monarch Pledge. It would be valuable to have resources that support community-driven planning, including facilitation guides, culturally relevant programming ideas, and data on nature-access disparities.

### **What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

Our Environmental Stewardship Committee, appointed by Council, had a large turn-over of volunteers in 2025. Many of the initiatives were to be run by those volunteers who left, so it has been the responsibility of the remaining members to complete the actions. Those that have been working on completing the actions have been working hard and are looking forward to taking the pledge again in 2026 to further their efforts.
