Pledge Summary

The City of Palm Springs pledges to helping Monarch butterflies and other pollinators through City initiatives. Since Monarch caterpillars will only feed on milkweed, the City of Palm Springs Maintenance Department has planted milkweed plants at city parks, City Hall, the Community Garden and in medians throughout the City.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. Our materials are available in English and in Spanish, and we are working to extend monarch-friendly habitats throughout our city, but we hope to engage all communities further in 2023.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The City of Palm Springs uses the Mayor's Monarch Pledge as a beacon for our efforts throughout our community to improve habitats for native species, including the monarch. Programs supporting the Pledge are a great entry point for community members who want to help maintain Palm Springs as a welcoming habitat for wildlife.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to

help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Our community members respond well to things like seed giveaways and informational pamphlets, and our City staff to best practices from other municipalities. We would love to continue to leverage best practices and other resources to help us expand access to nature perhaps beyond the scope of what limited staffing in a small municipality might allow - for example, how can we continue to develop low-maintenance natural areas so that we can expand more of them across our city?

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We had a relatively rapid and complete staff transition in the early fall of 2022, resulting in an entirely new team managing this portfolio. As a result, we have some data gaps for 2022 activities, but we will continue to track more thoroughly and advance pledge actions for 2023.

Planting monarch gardens is a key component of our Farmers Market outreach strategy. Monthly, we host a table at the market where we distribute bookmarks embedded with milkweed seeds and give residents advice about planting these gardens. The materials and our outreach staff are available to provide guidance in English and in Spanish.

The demonstration garden is located in front of the Palm Springs Airport, which is not a specifically relevant location to the monarch but is a high-visibility location for local residents and visitors, who pass it upon each entrance to and exit from the airport.

Our primary partner for this garden was our local water utility, Desert Water Agency.
