Pledge Summary

The Borough of Franklin Lakes, New Jersey, is a residential suburban community located in northwest Bergen County. It is a close knit family community, with an outstanding school system, library and recreation programs. Mayor Bivona of Franklin Lakes, NJ is committed to saving the monarch butterfly by signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge and he looks forward to engaging residents into building more monarch friendly gardens throughout the town.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. Currently, we created our 3 Butterfly Gardens in public parks located in Franklin Lakes. In the future, we would like to plant at local elementary schools.

We're receiving a lot of assistance through the Girl Scouts of Franklin Lakes which is open to all girls in Franklin Lakes. Participation is not mandatory and no payment is necessary as all costs are being covered by the Franklin Lakes Environmental Committee (pay the costs of milkweed and nectar producing plants).

There are less than 100 girl scouts and leaders in town. So in total I'd say roughly 30 girls/ 6 adults have participated in creating our butterfly gardens - planting, digging or painting.

Surprised by the public reaction at the Franklin Lakes Town Fair - were surprised by the Monarch Plight and really want to help sustain the species. Next year, would like to sell or give milkweed plants and seeds away at the Fair.

When I was creating the Monarch Butterfly Garden at the Parsons Pond Park location, I noticed that the Franklin Lakes Department of Public Works were mowing the wild native milkweed that were growing in the park. I spoke with the Franklin Lakes' Borough Administrator, Greg Hart, regarding this matter. Why were we planting 30 milkweed plants when the DPW were mowing down a hundred? It didn't make sense to me or him. Therefore, on July 22, 2021; Greg Hart met with the Franklin Lakes' Department of Public Works (DPW) Supervisor, Richard Lilenthal. The purpose of the meeting was to inform the DPW that the wild native milkweed currently growing at the Parsons Pond Park location was NOT to be mowed on a go forward basis.

1) Wrote an article entitled "The Monarch Butterfly and the Importance of Milkweed" that is to be downloaded to the Borough of Franklin Lakes "The Latest Buzz" section in Spring 2022. 2) Saturday, September 25, 2021 - Franklin Lakes Town Fair. Created a Monarch Milkweed Pot which by chance had a Monarch cocoon on one of the milkweed leaves. The Monarchs and Milkweed were a huge hit! We had a lot of traffic stopping by our booth and expressing interest in how to create their own Monarch Butterfly Refuge in their home gardens. I had some informational flyers at the booth that I had laminated, but I didn't make enough copies for people to take. I was inadequately prepared - I underestimated the public's interest. As a result, the flyers were posted onto the Borough's website under the "Environmental Commission - Create A Monarch Butterfly Refuge in Your Garden" - How to create a Monarch Butterfly Garden - List of Native Milkweed to NJ - List of Native Plants, Shrubs and Flowers that attract Butterflies 3) Created a Monarch Milkweed Pot that I had used as an example for the Town Fair. I wanted to let people know - even those with limited gardening space - that they can still help the survival of the Monarch by creating a Monarch Refuge Pot. This pot contained some milkweed and some pollinating flowers. This pot was then placed in front of Borough Hall as a form of advertising.

The signs are located at the 3 Butterfly Gardens 1) Franklin Lakes Nature Preserve - 1 Nature Preserve Way, Franklin Lakes, NJ 2) Memorial Pond Park - 480 DeKorte Drive, Franklin Lakes, NJ 3) Parsons Pond Park - Parsons Pond Road, Franklin Lakes, NJ All three signs are identical and were dedicated on September 13, 2021. The signs describe the Monarch Butterfly Life Cycle and the Monarch Butterfly Migration and in addition provide information regarding native plants and the importance of milkweed. All information contained on the sign was obtained from the "Monarch Watch.org" website. Collected and painted rocks orange and black in honor of the Monarch Butterfly. The rocks were painted by Girl Scout Troop #97777 and then used to outline the Milkweed planted in the Butterfly Garden located at Memorial Pond Park. The milkweed that was originally planted at Memorial Pond Park (06/15/21) was inadvertently pulled by 'someone' (party unknown at this time) believing they were weeds. This milkweed was replaced and replanted in August 2021. So the painted rocks not only add interest and beauty to the Butterfly Garden but also more importantly surround the milkweed plants to let individuals know these plants are important!

Butterfly Garden at the Franklin Lakes Nature Preserve (Created 06/10/21) located at 1 Nature Preserve Way, Franklin Lakes, NJ is over 200 sq feet - we planted 35 milkweed plants and 4 nectar plants Butterfly Garden at Memorial Pond Park (Created 06/15/2021) located at 480 DeKorte Drive, Franklin Lakes, NJ is roughly 115 sq feet - we planted 15 milkweed plants and 2 nectar plants. Butterfly Garden at Parsons Pond Park (Created 06/16/21) located at Parsons Pond Road, Franklin Lakes, NJ is roughly 70 sq feet and we planted 25 milkweed plants and 1 butterfly bush.

The Girl Scouts planted 75 milkweed plants and roughly 8 nectar plants between the 3 Butterfly Gardens that were created. In addition, Girl Scout Troop #96807 created a pollinator garden on a local farm in town. They created their garden to increase the awareness of the honeybee. The farm has over 20 honeybee hives on its property. The girls learned about the honeybee from a master beekeeper from a nearby town, ie what plants.
