Pledge Summary

Nestled between the Santa Cruz Mountains and San Francisco Bay, Mountain View is a diverse community, ideally located in the heart of the Silicon Valley (10 miles north of San Jose and 35 miles south of San Francisco). At just over 12 square miles, the City is home to 82,376 residents per the 2020 U.S. Census, many nationally and internationally known corporations, and a thriving small business base. On April 27, 2021 the Mayor of Mountain View, Ellen Kamei, signed a proclamation to join the Mayor's Monarch Pledge through the National Wildlife Federation and kicked off the City's efforts to: 1. Continue native plant enhancement at Shoreline at Mountain View that has been ongoing for the past 10 years to increase biodiversity to benefit many local species, including monarch butterflies; 2. Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants; and 3. Host a native seed giveaway facilitated through Mountain View Public Library's Seed Library program to make milkweed seeds available to the public with additional education and outreach of butterfly-friendly planting being conducted as part of the City's Arbor Day Tree Giveaway program.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

Our City is embarking on a wildlife management plan for our regional park and a citywide biodiversity strategy because both were established as City Council Goals through input from the residents of Mountain View.

Guide to issuing proclamation was heavily utilized prior to this year's pledge because we thought we needed to adopt the proclamation prior joining the pledge.

The City is excited to be a part of the pledge and has enjoyed having the ability to leverage the pledge with community partners.

Selected Action Items

Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

Please describe the groups you engaged with and how you engaged with these groups below.

The City leveraged the Mayor's Monarch Pledge to received grant funding that was used to create .21 acres of pollinator habitat inside the City's regional park. The City then partnered with a number of volunteer groups to install the irrigation, remove invasive species and weeds, plant the pollinator plants (including native milkweed), and lay groundcover to complete the phase 1 of the project. Phase 2 will be to expand the pollinator habitat acreage and Phase 3 will be to create another pollinator habitat at another location within the regional park.
