## Pledge Summary

Algonquin is a town in the northwest suburbs of Chicago with a population of roughly 30,000. The city is nestled in the Fox River valley and is home to over 430 acres of restored natural area. President Sosine of Algonquin, IL has committed to saving the Monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging the community in establishing more pollinator habitat throughout the Village.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with developers, planners, landscape architects, and other community leaders and organizers engaged in planning processes to identify opportunities to create monarch habitat.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

As Part of the Village of Algonquin Public Works team, staff have worked directly with our landscape contractors to ensure that pollinator habitat is preserved and not mowed. We partner with our Recreation Department to utilize these areas for educational opportunities. Village of Algonquin staff host county-level stormwater BMP talk and tour events, where local municipalities, non profits, and other governmental organizations attend to learn about utilizing green infrastructure. Our most recent talk and tour was held on Friday, July 25th, 2025 at the Dixie Creek Reach 5 restoration site and was attended by over 25 people.

**Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and associated opportunities to create monarch habitat.**

In 2025, the Village of Algonquin had a two-pronged approach to engage with various land managers to identify opportunities to create monarch habitat. 1) Within Village of Algonquin municipal Boundary: We consistently review all development plans and identify areas that require ecological restoration, maintenance, or preservation and hold developers accountable to meeting our requirements for green infrastructure development. This work is supported by the Village of Algonquin Public Works through our team of Engineers and our Village Ecologist. 2) Outside of our municipal boundary: There have been multiple opportunities for the Village of Algonquin to share our cutting edge Natural Area and Green Infrastructure Program to other communities, leaders, and land managers. Two examples in 2025 have included: Speaking at the Center for Watershed Protection's National Watershed and Stormwater Conference. The Village gave a presentation about the collaboration required to protect the Woods Creek Watershed. The presentation highlighted the stream and riparian restoration work that has been accomplished over the past 20 years within the Woods Creek Watershed. Speaking at the McHenry County Stormwater Forum which was attended by over 100 people from all over the state of Illinois. The presentation focused on watershed planning, funding restoration projects, and the maintenance required for ecologically restored habitats.

291.6 acres

**Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.**

The Village of Algonquin continued its robust natural area maintenance program in 2025. The Village conducted twelve prescribed burns within our network of established, ecologically restored natural areas, totaling 127.6 acres. The Village also contracted for \$100,600 worth of natural areas maintenance activities within our established natural areas, covering 164 additional acres of habitat maintained in 2025. Maintenance activities included: 1) Using prescribed fire to reduce invasive woody plants 2) Spot herbicide treatments to individual plants of concern 3) Mowing of newly planted areas to a height of 6-12" to keep annual weeds at bay 4) Spot mowing areas of dense annual or biennial weeds 5) Winter brushing to remove larger diameter woody invasive species
