Parks and Recreation manages and maintains several butterfly gardens throughout the City. The Health and Sustainability departments are valuable partners in promoting conservation efforts City-wide.

Local Master Naturalists volunteer extensively to manage a wildscape located within the City Limits. They have been instrumental in removing invasive plants and propagating native nectar-producing plants in that area. The Berkner Park Neighborhood Association partnered with us to build a second butterfly garden at Berkner Park. Funding for the garden was split between the Neighborhood Association and the City of Richardson.

We maintain several pollinator-friendly gardens in parks throughout the city, including Berkner Park, Yale Park, Collins Park, Prairie Creek Park, and Durham Park.

We have partnered with HOAs and neighborhood associations to construct and maintain these gardens.

We manage a program through which the City partners with Homeowner Associations and Neighborhood Associations to install and/or renovate landscaping in public areas. We have been very successful promoting the establishment of butterfly gardens with these groups over the last several years. This year, we worked with the Berkner Park Neighborhood Association to share the cost of planting a second butterfly garden in the City's Berkner Park. We also engage with a local chapter of the Master Naturalists and assist them in planting and caring for native landscape and nectar-producing plants.
