Staff manages several large acreages, and approximately 5 acres of previously mowed land was reverted to a no-mow area this year. Staff is regularly engaged and educated on importance of pollinator-friendly plants, and recommends planting of same to community groups.

Efforts were solely focused on removing ligustrum from the City's nature area. Invasive plants are removed mechanically by hand and stumps are treated to prevent re-growth.
