Volunteers from Texas Master Naturalists have worked tirelessly to promote native plant success in one particular area of Richardson. We are investigating the feasibility of instituting no-mow zones in areas that were previously mowed, and will be planting native blackland prairie plants at the conclusion of a nearby construction project.
