How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

The Village of Port Chester is a majority low-income community with a very high Hispanic population (60-65%) so all Mayors Monarch pledge activities involve engaging with low-income communities.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The pledge was brought to the Mayor's attention by the Port Chester Sustainability Committee. The intention was to raise awareness of pollinator population declines, and start creating pollinator-friendly habitat where possible in the Village. We plan to take the pledge next year, adding more pollinator habitat in different locations.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Examples of language for educational signage would be helpful. It would also be helpful to have a separate Mayor Monarch pledge page available in Spanish, so we could link to it, instead of having to translate everything. The Village of Port Chester is a small geographical area and is densely populated, so space for pollinator-friendly habitat is not always easily available. We chose "Planting or maintaining a pollinator-friendly demonstration garden" because we knew, particularly in our 1st year, that we would not be able to plant a large area, so we were surprised to be asked how many "Acres" we had planted. We're sure other communities are in similar positions, so it would be less intimidating to add "square feet" to the question.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Although we signed the pledge early in the year, our intention for the Bush Homestead in Lyon Park was to grow milkweed plants from seed, then plant them out in the Fall because we have no watering facilities at the homestead garden and wanted the new plants to survive their first season. As a result, they have only been in place for just over a month. In Lyon Park, where the Bush Homestead is located, the Department of Public Works has begun to mow over leaves in the Fall, rather than blowing and removing them. This will reduce noise pollution; create natural fertilizer for the soil; provide better winter habitat for insects and birds; and increase pollinator numbers in the park generally. At the Middle School, a member of the Port Chester Sustainability Committee partnered with a teacher (in the spring) to conduct a lawn survey with children (showing them the low number of plant species growing in the area that was to become the native plant meadow) and discussing why a native wild-flower meadow was a more sustainable option than an area of mowed lawn. The creation of the meadow will be used for on-going teaching about native plants, pollinators and sustainability. There are plans to expand the meadow annually, reducing the amount of lawn and increasing pollinator habitat. The Mayors Monarch Pledge was included in the local paper – The Westmore News (circulation 3500) - when Mayor Luis Marino, Village Manager Stuart Rabin, and members of the Port Chester Sustainability Committee were photographed at the Homestead Garden with the signage and milkweed (photo attached). It was also featured on the Port Chester Sustainability Committee's Instagram & Facebook pages.
