Communications and Convening

Developed the entrance to a 13 acre site that the NWA manages, created a designated parking area for visitors, set up a perimeter planting area with Village help.

We currently are not chemically treating any Village owned property.

We work with the NWA proscribed burns on approximately 5 acres under our jurisdiction, on a total of nearly 20 acres we help the NWA cutting invasive trees and treating the stumps with a herbicide.

We currently have five sites that we are working with neighbors to manage with our help. As a Village Trustee I have report on my department's (Pollinator Habitat and Restoration Enhancement dept - PHRED) on a monthly basis and we encourage our residents to join in working on road ROW's and vacant land the Village owns.

The MOWB has started working with us this past year, this is the first year the developer has turned the property over to them. Working with Public Works dept to establish areas of reduced mowing. One area is a steep hillside that is difficult to mow, Public Works will determine how much of this can be replanted with natives. Another area is a boulevard between the village and an unincorporated area that the Village maintains, we are working to reduce mowing in that location

Started a native seed bank to encourage residents to collect native plant seed to be distributed at a later date. This was accomplished is a series of events.
