## Pledge Summary

We pledge to improve the habitat of the Monarch Butterfly in the Village of Mamaroneck. We will continue to educate residents on the importance of not using pesticides and planting milkweed and native nectar producing plants.

## Action Items Committed for 2022

(1) We cleared a 6,500 square foot lot of invasives to enhance milkweed found there! We also planted hundreds of native plants and countless seeds. (2) 50 sq ft garden is starting to be planted at Harbor Island Park, along the Long Island Sound. (3) We planted a small pollinator garden in Columbus Park.

We engaged a local non-profit organization: CRC (Community Resource Center) to help spread the message of planting milkweed and native plants, various ways. Additionally, we co-hosted a zoom + craft for children with our public library. Finally, ALL activities, events, seeds and plants were ALWAYS offered FREE! Our Monarch Festival flyer was advertised in both English and Spanish for a larger community reach.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

Our volunteer Committee for the Environment is passionate about educating residents on maintaining yards without use of chemicals, leaving the leaves, planting native plants and assisting our pollinators wherever possible.

We would love to see ready-made graphics for social media to further educate residents with attention grabbing facts. Additionally, providing engaging handouts and signage that can be used in the community would help spread the word.

Our Committee for the Environnement jumped into action this year, spurred on by the Mayor's commitment. Village of Mamaroneck Committee for the Environment member, Mandy Sticos, hosts a hyper local Facebook group: Planting for Pollinators Mamaroneck / Larchmont. It has been an excellent tool for engagement with all levels of resident gardeners. Our committee received a milkweed seed donation from Monarch Watch in early 2022. The seeds were cold stratified and grown from January till June when 60 common milkweed seedlings were

given to Facebook group members to plant in their gardens! Additionally, we acquired Spanish language brochures on maintaining a Healthy Yard. These were distributed by CRC (Community Resource Center) at our Monarch festival on 9/24 to Spanish speaking residents.

Ann is the former Chair of Monarch Joint Venture and the author of, Monarch Butterflies, a children's book. Ann has endless knowledge on gardening and monarch lifecycle and conservation. She read the book and followed it with a pipe cleaner / pony bead bracelet craft, which symbolized all stages of the monarch butterfly. Children picked up a free craft kit from the library before the zoom and joined in for the craft.

In conjunction with the author reading zoom, our committee received monarch and native plant book donations from 4 different publishers and donated them to the library. One was of course, Monarch Butterflies by Ann Hobbie. The library was present at our Monarch Butterfly Festival on 9/24 and started a seed library. Our committee donated milkweed, native flower seeds and literature to display along with the seed box on the Monarch Butterfly from Monarch Watch.

Community Resource Center is a 501 (c)(3) community-based organization that empowers immigrant and low-income families in Mamaroneck. The Village of Mamaroneck Committee for the Environment discussed educating their members on the migration of the Monarch Butterfly. CRC came up with the idea to host an art workshop for families over 2 weekends. The 12 families who attended a workshop learned about the Monarch butterfly and crafted art inspired by the lesson. The artwork was displayed and appreciated by 700+ guests at the Mamaroneck Monarch Butterfly Festival on 9/24/22. The CRC building has been closed since Hurricane Ida in 2021. When they return to their facility in 2023 we hope to help them plant milkweed plants to support the effort.

**Please describe when the lots were converted to monarch habitat and the planned maintenance schedule.**

On June 7, 2022 more than 130 common milkweed plants were identified on an empty lot that is owned by our Village. The Committee for the Environment cordoned it off and our Village Mayor, Village Manager and Parks Department were notified. They agreed to let it grow for the season. We did some light weeding around the milkweed stands to eliminate invasives choking out the milkweed. By the end of October with more than 80 volunteers the land was cleared of invasive mug wort, porcelain berry and Japanese knotweed. Milkweed roots were not disturbed, and we have since planted 100% percent native seeds and plants donated from our community. Two traffic slowing bump outs located at the intersection of Fenimore Road and Prospect Avenue in Mamaroneck, NY 10543. This location needed to buffer and slow traffic. It's been an issue for years and after our traffic commission passed the need for "bump outs" The Village Manager invited the Environmental Committee to be involved in the planning of the project. Plants were delayed for planting until spring to ensure best success while we are experiencing a cold snap!

We used the Mamaroneck Monarch Festival as our seed giveaway event. It ensured the most captured attention on conveying an important message of planting milkweed. We distributed 250 milkweed seed packets with planting instructions and another 200 packets of native nectar producing flowers. Post festival, we gave away 100 leftover packets of milkweed packets to residents via a facebook post! We asked residents to register to ensure proper volunteer staffing and supplies for crafts. Children enjoyed a mini obstacle course which symbolized the migration of the monarchs (showed how far they traveled) and had fun monarch facts displayed. Most importantly, children received a passport and received stickers and stamps in the passport while completing stations on the migration course. All guests enjoyed butterfly themed activities and art projects (i.e. butterfly painted hands, lifecycle paper craft, butterfly popsicle puppets, butterfly mobiles and more). The festival was at the Village of Mamaroneck's Harbor Island Park along the Long Island Sound. The Mamaroneck Monarch Festival in numbers: 764 Residents attended the Mamaroneck Monarch Butterfly Festival 399 passports were distributed for the mini obstacle course from the Recreation Dept. 300 reusable totes from Apple Bank distributed 250 packets of milkweed were given to families (please plant them soon!) 200 native flower seed packets were distributed 40 high school students and 10 adult volunteers made the event run smoothly 13 companies/organizations provided crafts, activities, performances and an art installation 12 monarch butterflies were spotted migrating to Mexico over Pavilion Field! 7 plants donated by Weaver Gardens 4 food trucks offered tasty treats 3 large boxes of snacks donated by North Shore Farms, Stop and Shop and Trader Joe's 1 butterfly garden planted with seeds to grow for Spring 2023, thanks to the Parks Dept! We identified a piece of village owned land riddled with every invasive species. We have since cleared it and are in the process of installing native plants and seeds this month. We are at about 100 volunteers who have helped thus far and can be called on for other projects in spring. Approximately 6,500 square feet was treated.
