Pledge Summary

We pledge to improve the habitat of the Monarch Butterfly in the Village of Mamaroneck. We will continue to educate residents on the importance of not using pesticides and planting milkweed and native nectar producing plants.

- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.
- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city’s Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.

The Village of Mamaroneck recently installed two bump-outs on a busy four way stop intersection. They are located at Fenimore Road and Prospect Avenue. The Village selected native plants and bushes to plant on either side of the road. We will continue to add to both beds in early spring, including adding some butterfly milkweed. Plants that were selected need to be on the shorter side to ensure drivers can turn and proceed safely.

The education of Village of Mamaroneck residents by the Committee for the Environment is ongoing all year. This year to kick off the countdown of our Monarch Butterfly festival our elected officials made Butterfly Weed (tuberosa) the official flower of the Village of Mamaroneck. Our local paper included this in an article, as pictured. Every local community event our volunteers are invited to (earth day celebrations, cub scout meetings, library gatherings) we display educational materials and giveaway free native seeds, especially milkweed. Our Instagram and Facebook pages have a combined following of 2,000 locals. Leading up to our festival, almost every post is an educational fact about Monarch Butterflies. Our festival event flyers are village wide in local establishments and digitally shared by our local school PTAs, Girl Scouts, social groups and the Village's in-

house digital newsletter that reaches thousands. Our Monarch festival flyer is also available in Spanish. One of our partners at the festival is the CRC (community resource center). This local non-profit spreads the word to our Spanish speaking residents.

Rockland Pocket Preserve got a sign, a ribbon cutting ceremony and two beautiful benches installed along the Sheldrake River. This project has been an amazing volunteer driven effort. In early 2023 we began communication with a local non-profit organization called Sarah Neuman Nursing Home (The New Jewish Home) about installing a native plant butterfly garden for their elderly residents to enjoy. Two types of milkweed were included. Our committee proposed a few size garden plans and Sarah Neuman selected one within their budget. Our committee selected final plants, helped with delivery and planted them with our volunteers. On June 14, we held a ribbon cutting attended by local elected officials, including our Mayor, Tom Murphy.

The Village of Mamaroneck opened a Dog Park in Spring of 2023. The Committee for the Environment approached the Village Manager to inquire about plantings that were planned to beautify the long chain link fence. After a few meetings with the Village Manager and the Village Parks Department our volunteers were granted permission to plant native plants (and milkweed) on the outside of the dog park fence. This Fall our committee received 192 FREE plants from Garden for Wildlife. We started the dog park plantings on each end of the fence with these plants. The garden plot will continue in 2024.

This was our 2nd Monarch Butterfly Festival in the Village of Mamaroneck! It was expanded from last year to 3 hours. Our event is FREE and hosted in our largest park, Harbor Island Park. Our vendors each have a free activity or craft based on Monarch butterflies or pollinators for all guests to enjoy. All kids receive a "passport" and receive stickers as they complete activities on our mini obstacle course. The obstacles have signs on how many miles they've traveled along with fun monarch facts along the course. Guests planted milkweed in a new garden patch that will come up in Spring. The Committee for the Environment gave away hundreds of native seed packets, milkweed included. We also hosted a plant sale on site and sold our newly recognized official flower of the Village of Mamaroneck, Butterfly Milkweed. Our event flyer is published in English and Spanish months prior to the event. We do a huge email outreach to all social clubs (adult and children) to encourage them to spread the word.
