Woodstock Illinois is home to about 25,000 residents and is located in the Northwest suburbs of Chicago. Mayor Turner committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge on February 7, 2023. The City of Woodstock, alongside it's residents and environmental ambassadors, look forward to engaging, educating, and advocating for more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.

Systems Change

- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.

Public Works maintains and monitors the right of ways within the City as well as approximately 545 acres of City Parks. The Environmental Commission meets monthly along with the City's employee liaison, the Director of Public Works. Additionally, the City maintains a service contract with The Land Conservancy to provide guidance and service for protected areas within the City.

In Progress

The City of Woodstock and Environmental Commission are working towards becoming a recognized Tree City USA. Action item is listed as in progress as we have not enacted any new ordinances to support the change. Public Works staff have implemented changes including planting more milkweed at every opportunity. The only ordinance changes specifically will come from Tree City USA requirements, including a tree maintenance

ordinance currently being drafted by the Environmental Commission. The tree ordinance should be enacted 2024.
