We are now looking into controlling the invasive species in our park so that more native plants have a chance to flourish.

## Selected Action Items

### **Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.**

Members of the CPBC met with representatives of Crandall Public library and encouraged the library to plant a pollinator garden. The garden was completed by the library this past year. Members of the CPBC have also reached out to local business, Stewart's Shoppes to encourage them to plant a pollinator garden in the new shop being opened on Glen Street.

We worked with the Glens Falls DPW regarding mowing around the pollinator garden. Jodi, the manager of DPW for Crandall Park, instructed his workers to turn the mower away from the pollinator garden when mowing. One small change helped with our maintenance of the pollinator garden. We had much less weeding of grass and could concentrate on thinning the pollinators.

We met with Jodi and discussed the situation and he made the change.

No light fixture or lamp shall be greater than the aggregate of 60 watts incandescent or lumen equivalent if other bulb type.
