## Pledge Summary

The City of Plano is home to approximately 294,152 residents and is located just North of Dallas. Plano is recognized as a leader in sustainability, as shown by their 2023 Texas Environmental Excellence Award. Plano is currently pursuing the National Wildlife Federation (NWF) Community Wildlife Habitat Certification. There are currently hundreds of wildlife habitats already located throughout the City including many Monarch habitats.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. We have a wide variety of habitats. Many of them are the private yards of residents. We are encouraging local schools to create garden clubs and plant school gardens. We also have a community garden and a display garden where we continue to add plants that are butterfly friendly.

While conducting community outreach in marginalized communities, we educate people about certifying their yards as wildlife habitats. We then inform people that many of the qualifications benefit the monarchs that migrate through the area.

Our community's motivation is brought about by the reality that as people and companies move into the area, the resources that the butterflies rely on decrease. We want to put forth effort to reverse this trend.

I think the guides have been the most helpful. We hand them out at many of our events. I think it would be great if the website had a section for printable brochures and flyers that we could use.

This event included table activities that educated participants on ways that they could make their yards more pollinator friendly. It's also worth noting that we hosted a butterfly gardening

class for City of Plano employees during "Employee Green Week" on Earth Day. Participating employees learned about several native butterfly species (including monarchs) and how to support them. After the classroom segment, they planted nectar plants in the Environmental Education Center's demonstration garden and chose nectar plants to take home.

We provide printed material at many of our outreach events that educate participants about signing up to have their yard be a certified wildlife habitat. This is usually accompanied with a high focus on butterfly habitats. We also post related content on the Live Green in Plano Facebook page and in the Live Green in Plano monthly e-news letter; screenshots from 2025 Facebook posts are attached. We launched a monthly newscast-style video series in 2025 called the "Live Green in Plano Buzz." The October episode featured a segment on monarch
