Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

Please describe the groups you engaged with and how you engaged with these groups below.

The Town of Montreat engages, through community individuals and through its own pocket park/rain-garden at the new Town of Montreat Town Hall, with community garden and beautification groups and urges the planting of native plants and plants hospitable for monarchs. Individuals from Montreat interact with the Black Mountain Beautification Committee in neighboring Town of Black Mountain. Through the Montreat Landcare Committee, which is an advisory group to the Town of Montreat and to which, in the current and prior years, the Town of Montreat commits financial support, there is intense focus in Montreat on the control of invasive plants, maintenance of the health of waterways (Flat Creek and its tributaries), and encouragement of planting native plants and plants hospitable to monarchs and other "full-time" residential and transitory (such as monarchs) wildlife. The pocket park/rain garden created at the new Town of Montreat Town Hall was funded through private donations -- an indication of the citizenry's commitment to the land - - and serves as an educational resource for all who visit this beautiful site. The pocket park/rain garden includes plants that attract monarchs. Discussions are underway of looking anew at the milkweed-seed giveaway project undertaken some years ago in Montreat and possibly repeating that project.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to host the event?

COVID-19 continues to shake the entire globe and, with it, the Town of Montreat. The annual Native Plant Sale (organized by the Montreat Landcare Committee, with the Town of Montreat as a constituent component), was again canceled in 2021. Typically held in April, near the April 22 Earth Day celebration, the Native Plant Sale was last held in 2019. Plans have been re-tooled continuously during the pandemic and in adherence to local municipal, county, and state requirements, the result of which has been the unfortunate and disappointing cancellation of the event in 2020 and 2021. In lieu of the 2021 event, the Native Plant Sale group of volunteers produced a brochure carrying information on native plants and promoting area landscape vendors that typically participate in the Native Plant Sale. Conversations about the 2022 Native Plant Sale -- scheduled for Saturday, April 23 -- continue, with full hopes in the community that 2022 will witness the return of this full-day event. Generally, 100-200 people from Montreat and the surrounding (including some distant!) areas participate.
