Pledge Summary

We are a small community of several hundred that swells by the thousands each summer. We conduct a native plant sale which includes many flowering plants and shrubs that attract monarch butterflies.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

Mayor's Monarch Pledge Network-Wide Meetings were superior informational meetings. Having these meetings recorded and available to rewatch increased communication to citizens who could not attend live chats. MonarchWatch.org has valuable educational resources that were valuable to send out to Montreat citizens who expressed interest in increasing the planting of milkweed and the importance of saving the monarch.

Montreat Landcare hopes to continue to partner with the nearby town of Black Mountain Garden Clubs to participate in their efforts to save monarchs as they increase their community pollinating gardens on public and private lands.

Montreat continued an invasive species removal program that supported and emphasized the re-establishment of native habitats for monarchs and other pollinators. The Montreat Landcare Committee launched a new trail project-an all persons accessible trail named "Flat Creek Crossing". It is Montreat's first all persons trail and it includes native habitat for monarchs and other wildlife.

Montreat hosted a native plant sale that focused on pollinators and their host plants (mainly milkweed). Over a dozen local nurseries and vendors participated. The western North Carolina nurseries offered a wide variety of native and compatible plants for home and garden. Information programs were scheduled throughout the day. Pollinator and native plant gardening experts provided a wealth of information. The public purchased over 100 milkweed plants from the nursery vendors. Approximately 200 people from Montreat and the surrounding areas participated at the annual sale and Arbor Day celebration.

Mayor's Monarch Pledge was issued by Mayor Tim Helms on April 23, 2022, at the Landcare Native Plant Sale. The Mayor raised awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. The Town's pledge to protect and support monarch butterflies encourages Montreators to plant milkweed and nectar plants, native to the area, to provide habitat for the monarch and other pollinators. The weekly Montreat Community Announcements from the Montreat Conference Center was the vehicle to bring awareness of planting milkweed and other native plants in private residences. The Montreat Landcare Committee provided timely announcements to summer and winter residents online through this weekly "Community Announcements." Rain Garden brochures were displayed at the Town Hall, The Nature Center and the Montreat Bookstore. The Montreat Conference Center held Garden Tours of private homes of Montreat residences as well as classes on how to plan and construct pollinating gardens. Two "Roads Scholars" conferences on gardening were provided in the spring and summer of 2022 by the Montreat Conference Center. The annual Town of Montreat Fourth of July parade had a Landcare Committee entry with the display of the banner of the Mayor's

Monarch Pledge. Brochures were handed out to the public after the parade. At the annual Montreat Cottagers Inc annual 2022 summer meeting, a display table of the pledge banner and literature on "Saving the Monarch" were available to the 200 meeting attendees.
